Why study it? (Goal)	Information of the American democratic system will expand students' knowledge of the functioning of effective political and social institutions, help them understand basic democratic principles in action, draw parallels between Ukrainian and American political traditions, and identify what can be adopted for the Ukrainian political and social life.
What can you learn	
(learning outcomes)	Upon completion of the course the student will be able to:
	- Comprehend key concepts and terms of American political, social, and cultural life;
	- Describe the evolution of the American political system from historical developments to its current effect on American society;
	- Comprehend the practices of American politics and the

relationship between various groups of interests;

- Evaluate the efficiency of the American national government and its role in national policymaking;

- Develop a more discerning and critical view of political information presented in the media;

- Understand the roots of various social problems related to ethnic and sexual minorities, immigrants, drugs, racism, etc.

- Explore and understand power relationships in American politics, the impact of social change on different groups and on society in general, and its overall effect on American political, social, and cultural life.

- Understand the impact of US domestic policy on its foreign policy, and to critically evaluate the United State's role in the world.

Discipline content: American Political Culture and American Character; British Legacy **Educational** and the Constitution; Immigration: Pros and Con; Continuity and Change in the American logistics Family; Women and Gender Issues in American society, Sports in American Culture, the (content) Role of Religion in American Society, Status and Social Class, the Elites; Drugs and Alcohol: Uses and Abuses; Problems of the Health Care System; Society and Sexuality (Homosexuality, Gender Patterns, Prostitution, Pornography); the American System of Education; What Attracts Students to American Universities; the Criminal Justice System, Organized Crime, Aging and the Power of the Pensioners; Corporations, Government Growth and Power, the Rise and Decline of the Unions; Urban life and Suburban Change; the Demographic Transition; Racial and Ethnic Problems (Whites, Blacks, Hispanic Americans, Asian Americans); Federalism, Social Movements and Minority Politics; Elections, the Media; the Culture of Entertainment, the Movie Industry (Hollywood); Political Parties and Interest Groups, Main Ideologies in US politics; Legislative Powers: Congress; Executive Powers: Presidency and Bureaucracy; Economy and Welfare Politics; National Security and Foreign Policy.
